1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to the RTM Nagpur University. The institution tries to ensure effective curriculum delivery provided by the University from different angles and perspective so that employable youths graduate from the institution. The delivery of curriculum is attempted through application oriented hands-on experience of learning, a constructive approach to teaching-learning and the use of ICT, online recourses and multimedia activities. These tools are also used to assess the students. The college provides opportunities for better exposure to the students by conducting field trips, technical training programs for students. The college has its own feedback mechanism on curriculum involving teachers, students and alumnae. These feedbacks are taken through specially designed questionnaires. The input received from the above stakeholders are complied and communicated to the respective authorities as suggestions for necessary action and implementation. At institute level the feedback is used to introduce add-on, value added courses as well as introducing new teaching methodologies in the curriculum. For example, on demand from Arts faculty, we have started basic computer skill courses like e-learning, ICT, C-language, Tally Hardware and networking etc. The college tries to integrate gender equity, environment conservation, human values and professional ethics into the curriculum in a variety of ways. While some of these are incorporated into curriculum content, the college also organizes various programmes, courses, activities and events to nurture these values.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Focal point of the criterion is Students Diversity. College admits is the students from other states and countries along with regular students. Five years data shows incredible boom in the number of enrolled students showing the growing reputation of the college. Reservation policy is strictly followed while admitting the students. The institute assesses the learning level of the students and introduces special programs for advance learners and slow learners accordingly, Bridge courses, Interface, Crash courses, add on courses, remedial coaching are such to name a few. The college recruits full time teachers' posts in time. For differently able students (though minimal) special facilities are provided. The college strives to pursue student-centric activities like Cleanliness drive, Nirmalya Visarjan, Community Extension. Mentor and Mentee, innovative teaching methods (Use of ICT) are widely adopted. We organize invited talks, motivational lectures and workshops run by eminent speakers. Almost all full time teachers are Ph.D. holders. Few teachers are from other states too. College adheres to some reformative programs like question bank, research papers, field visits, PPT Presentation competition, to measure Continuous Internal Evaluation. The college supervenes transparent mechanics of internal assessment. Examination related grievances are rectified efficiently. All the programs run by the college ascertain the hike in the passing percent of the students in last five years. (Supporting data is duly filled in)

Research, Innovations and Extension

Our college has been holding and conducting several research related programmes for several years for both the students and the faculties strictly following the UGC and Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University (RTMNU) guidelines. The college has a research centre, "Place of Higher Learning and Research" in Commerce recognized by the RTMNU. The college has highly qualified and academically active faculty members, many of them are Ph. D supervisors.

The college has excellent infrastructure of library, workspaces for faculty members, technological amenities and administrative support. We have conducted a number of programmes befitting and pertaining to industry-academia innovative practices.

Annually published Multi-disciplinary peer review journal "RAINBOW" where, we have stated Code of Ethics to check malpractices and plagiarism in Research. We also provide incentives to teachers who receive the state, national and international recognitions/awards and Ph. D's.

A large number of extension activities are carried out every year on issues like national integration, disaster management, gender sensitization, Swachha Bharat Mission, woman empowerment, etc. The nature of activities include social activities like Nirmalya visarjan, village adoption, tree plantation, cleanliness drive, guest lectures, blood donation camps, short term trainings aimed at enhancement of employability skills, yoga training, pre-election survey, field visit etc,. Our college has undertaken faculty exchange and students exchange programme in collaboration with other colleges. Regular study tours, field trips are organised by the college.

It is a constant endeavor on part of our multi-disciplinary institution to inculcate a sense of research and innovation in our students and faculties.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

College has facilities and infrastructure for the process of imparting knowledge to the students at UG and PG level for which adequate buildings, classrooms, seminar halls, laboratories along with a good reading library with e-access is available for students and staff. The entire campus has wi-fi and every classroom, seminar hall, library, laboratory has internet access. Every laboratory has LCD projectors for audio-visual lectures and demonstration. There are 60 computers in computer science, 60 computers in MCA, 10 computers in library for the access of students. Besides that there are computers with peripherals in departments. Audio visual aids for recording lectures, LCD projectors for UG and PG and Smart board are available. College has a rooftop Solar Panel array for sustainable electricity generation for the college apart from a diesel generator as a backup. The B.Voc department has facilities for recording of films, events and has halls for practice of stage craft, dramatics and acting. The Sports department is well equipped with indoor gymnasium, an air conditioned auditorium for conduction of Yoga exercises and outdoor facilities for conduction of kabaddi, khokho, volleyball and badminton. College has developed an wholesome approach towards overall development of students in sports, ICT and e-learning with available computers for complete development of students physically and intellectually. There is a constant upgradation and procurement of infrastructure, as and when needed, for the smooth running of college. College follows systematic policies for utilization and maintenance of physical, academic and support facilities on its campus.

Student Support and Progression

Criterion 5 indicates the participation of students in academics, mentoring and guidance for students, and progression of students towards higher level of education and employment.

Since the college students largely come from low socio-economic background, a significant number amongst them are benefitted from GOI Scholarship. The institution also helps needy students with admission fees, bus passes, bicycles and examination fees so that they do not face unnecessary hurdles in the learning process. Placement of students in jobs through career Counselling and Placement Cell is regularly carried out. A significant number of students are benefitted by Vocational training Courses aimed at skill development of students in various fields like Tally, Hardware and Networking, Soft Skills Development, Language Lab etc. The “Women Cell” and the “Disciplinary Committee ” of the College address the issues of discipline and redress the issues of women, if any.

The College keeps track of students progressing to post graduation and other higher courses after under-graduation. Sports and cultural activities at intra-collegiate and inter-collegiate level, are regularly organised. Essay and Poster Competition, elocution, skit and Debate Competition etc., are regularly conducted in the college.

The Alumni Association of the college actively organises various events like Blood Donation Camps, Tree Plantation, Placement drive, Stress Management etc. The Alumni Association also raises fund to help needy students of the college in their education. Thus, mentoring and progression of students in academic and extra-academic areas is taken care of by the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college governance promotes efficiency, transparency, participatory management and internal autonomy. It is decentralized through different levels and committees. Various committees work collaboratively and contribute to the overall smooth governance and functioning of the college. Various Statuary Bodies and Academic Committees conduct periodical meetings with principal, HODs, faculty members and students regularly to discuss the important issues, academic and administrative activities. The Principal permits the HODs and the staff members in performing freely the academic activities and administrative programmes like guest lectures, seminars and competitions etc. for the betterment of students. The college also has a range of welfare measures including Employee cooperative Society, financial help to attend conferences etc. The appraisal reports are analyzed and identified the strength and weakness of faculty. The performance appraisal system proves to bring out qualitative output in academic performance of the institution. The accounts and financial transactions adhere to norms and standards in practice with internal and external audits and multiple checks and balances. The college mobilizes funds through revenue generation and optimum utilization of resources. IQAC makes significant contributions to institutionalizing various processes and strategies including documentation and record keeping, monitoring, institutional planning and strategizing etc. The IQAC works to raise quality awareness of stakeholders, faculty members and students to make teaching -learning more innovative and effective. Regular feedback is collected from different stakeholders and inputted to planning and decision making.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution ensures the safety of the students especially the girls by installing CCTV Cameras at prominent places in the premises. Disciplinary committee is formed to take strict action against the miscreants.

Environment concern and sustainability has always been the mission of the institution and efforts have been made to make the environment Eco friendly by installation of solar panels, Plantation of trees on regular basis by NSS, NCC and Rotract club, sanitary napkin incinerator, vermicomposting of wet waste, creation of Oxygen Park, segregation of waste into dry and wet waste, ban on plastic, wall paper on environment, E-waste disposal drives etc. The institution has also installed energy efficient LED lights to conserve energy. Rain harvesting system has also been installed in the new building of the college for conservation of water.

Human values and professional ethics are inculcated in the students and faculties through Art of living courses, lectures by spiritual Gurus, Yoga and meditation workshops, manuals on code of conduct and human values and ethics. Along with academic and professional excellence, a sense of responsibility towards society has also been envisaged as a the part of our mission. Hence we encourage our students to organize community extension services to sensitize them to core human values. Donations of medicine to old age home, Nirmalay Visarjan Drives, Rubella Vaccination Camps , Bone Mineral Density Checkup camps, for the residents of nearby areas are some of best practices of the institution carried out on regular basis

4. Quality Indicator Framework(QIF)

Criterion 1 - Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The Institute is affiliated to RTM Nagpur University and hence follows the syllabus prescribed by it. The syllabus is designed by members of BOS of the various subjects and subject committees constituted by the university. Teachers of the college are members of BOS and Academic Committees appointed or nominated by the University for various subjects.

The curriculum is developed and implanted in a structured manner as follows.

(A) Allocation of subjects and teaching workload to teachers.

In the beginning of the session Principal and HOD's allocate the subjects and workload to teachers as prescribed by the University. While allocating subject teachers' view are solicited to ensure that all teachers get the right medium for maximum teaching learning output.

(B) Preparation of Time-Table

After the subject allocation, department wise, class wise and teacher wise time tables are prepared by the respective HOD's and circulated among teachers and students.

(C) Submission of teaching plan by teachers

- All faculty members communicate the whole curriculum to students at the beginning of academic session.
- All the faculty members prepare curriculum which in such a way that it covers the syllabus prescribed by the university.
- All the faculty members prepare their teaching plans according to prescribed teaching units and academic calendar of the university.
- The teaching plans are submitted to IQAC. Also, it is mentioned in academic diaries which all the teachers receive at the beginning of the session.

(D) Teaching aids

- Every subject teacher uses the teaching aids to make teaching effective.
- Teachers provide charts, models and specimens to the students.
- Teachers use digital class room for effective teaching.
- Teachers provide power point presentation, hard copies, and web site address to the students to enhance their knowledge.
- Field work and demonstration method are used for effective teaching.

(E) Practicals

- All the laboratories are well equipped along with LCD projector and computer.
- During practical's charts are provided to the students.
- Group demonstrations are given to the students.
- Students maintain the practical journals and results are verified by the subject teacher regularly.
- Departmental library is provided for the students for their concerned practicals.
- Software's are provided to the students for their concerned practicals.

SEVEN STEP FLOW CHART OF CURRICULUM IMPLEMENTATION

The college has a transparent and participatory process of deploying the action plan for effective implantation of curriculum.

1. Month of April – End of Academic session: Annual program plan is prepared by each department.
2. Month of May – June: Summer vacations, IQAC prepares the academic colander.
3. Month of June – July: AQAR is prepared by IQAC and presented to LMC.
4. Month of June – July: Teacher prepare teaching plan for each subject.
5. Month of July- August: Consultation of IQAC with HOD's to adjust academic colander and implementation of teaching plan.
6. Month of October and January: Periodic review through student's feedback and stakeholders' feedback.
7. Month of March – April: Yearly reporting the academic activities and events by department and different cells.

- Environment studies have been made mandatory by the University in the second year of all UG courses.
- College gives emphasis on “Green Campus- Clean Campus”. We organize tree plantation, save water campaign, Swaccha Bharat Abhiyan, Poster Competition under various cells
- A proper rain water harvesting system has been established in the new building of the college.
- The bio-degradable and non-biodegradable waste of the college is segregated into blue and red bins under “**Green Garbage Drive**”.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

To address the special needs of the advance learners and slow learners some substantial programs are organized. After admitting students in the institution, the institution assesses the learning levels of the students so as to form the data of slow learners and advance learners. At the time of admission all course co-coordinators counsel with the students/ parents and introduce them with their strength and weakness in order to plan a suitable course map for them.

Bridge Course

Bridge Course of one week's duration is conducted by each department at the commencement of the session with the detail profiling of students.. Teachers' design the course module to help students to revise and strengthen the basic concepts of school learning and make the transition to a higher-level of learning smoothly. These programs help identifying slow learners and advance learners.

Crash Courses

To address the academic skills of the students, the college runs crash courses keeping in view the students requirements at the commencement of academic sessions. Learning Skills, Fundamentals of English Grammar, Business correspondence, use of ICT are few of them that are run at the session's start. Mobile E-learning, Soft skill courses and Srujanatmak Lekhan, Janasanchar and Mudrit Shodhak are some other courses slated to be run in the middle of the session in boosting up students' round development and grooming their personality.

Other than academic skills, the college caters to the needs of the students to prove themselves in the competitive world. Throughout the session, all the departments organize guest lectures, seminars of the students, power point competitions of the students to equip them with outstanding skills to perform in the society. The students accountability is thus addressed through Training and Placement Cell of the college

that organizes some grooming sessions that include Interview Techniques, Group Discussion, Entrepreneurship development and other soft skills oriented programs.

Remedial Coaching

Remedial programs are used to address gaps in basic skills. Slow and poor learners are identified according to their performance in the last qualifying examination through perennial monitoring by subject teacher and mentors. Teachers conduct extra classes to fill the gap in the learning ability of each of the student. They try to simplify concepts, organize special counseling programs, administer drills and exercises at their level by intimating the principal. Special remedial coaching is offered to the students who fail in the examination but are allowed to appear in examination to avail ATKT facility.

Seminars

For advance learners seminars are organized to teach key concepts in the class. These are class-room activities on regular teaching-learning process.

Add-on Courses

In such programs Tally, Hardworking and Networking workshops are organized to groom the students in developing Entrepreneurship skills. Soft Skills, Yoga, Spoken English are some other add-on courses students are benefitted with. Students were benefitted with Internet Training. Self Defense Training Courses are organized for the Girl Students. Web site designing course make the students familiar with Technology based skills.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The college focuses on student-centric teaching-learning process by adopting the following measures:

- Learning experience is enhanced through the use of role play methods. Case studies are used to enable the student understand the concept clearly.
- Different departments have deployed innovative strategies to involve students in activity based learning. Mathematics Department, Economics Deptt. , History deptt. Conduct **Quiz competition, Intercollegiate Debate Competition**. Some departments organize **Seminars** for the students to generate students' interest in their respective subjects. Similarly, some departments organize **Interface** programs.
- Management games are organized by BBA department every year to enable the students understand the functions of manager.
- The program like **tree plantation Hindi Diwas, Signature competition, Handwriting Competition, Essay Writing Competition, Sachitra Suvichar Competitions** are some of the unique events the college arrange to address the needs of the taught.
- Project based assignments like "**Srujan**", wall magazine develops students ability to make posters, exhibits that are displayed on wall and give demos and presentation on different current topics.
- Students of the college have emerged winners in inter university science exhibition called '**Avishkar**, an exhibit of inquiry based learning.'
- Every year the college organises "**Prayas**", an intercollegiate research paper competition for the students to nudge research aptitude in the students.

Above activities are focused on active, participatory 'learning by doing' rather than passive 'learning by listening.'

Fostering critical thinking

Group discussions, case studies, brain storming sessions, problem solving and role play are some of the techniques used in the class room to break the tedium of blackboard teaching or the lecture method. For example **BBA department** organizes **paper presentation program** for final year students. **English Department** organizes **crash courses** to have hands on sessions on Business Correspondence, ICT. Case study presentation is organized for M.Com students.

Experiential Learning

Experiential Learning is fostered by involving students in practicals, projects, internships. A few examples may be cited: Students of Home economics do work under **Earn and Learn program**. Preparation of, chutanis and sale is observed meticulously. Library Deptt. Hired the students for earn and learn and quantified data with the help of the students on daily wages.

Promotion of Scientific temper

Scientific temper is fostered among the students by engaging them in research work and projects. The college organizes visits to prominent research institutes, Industries, National as well as city based. Students represent the college in Science fests, exhibitions and competitions. Students bag prizes in '**Avishkar.**'

Participatory Learning

The college recognizes the importance of contextualizing collegiate learning of students with the socio-cultural and economic reality of the society in which they live. Participative learning methodology is applied in inculcating social values in the students. Students are encouraged to participate in cleanliness drive, Nirmalya collection drive and visit and donations to old age home.

Performative Learning

B.VOC students' plays like TU ani Mi, Mukhote, Kalakriti, Girgit, Khushi, Holi are produced by the students. A Play by Munshi Premchand Sajjanta ka Dand was performed by the students.

- **Sixteen hours crash courses** an innovative activity the college is running since last couple of years as mentioned above to groom the students to stand in the society. It includes mobile-e-learning, English Speaking classes, Business correspondence, Fundamentals of English Grammar, Srujanatmak Lekhan, Soft Skills, Mudrit Shodhak, Jansanchar, Bhasha Kaushalya, Learning Skills, Handwriting Improvement Program, use of ICT.
- **Eminent speakers, Industry experts, consultants, Entrepreneurs, social workers are invited to deliver talks** to widen the horizons of learning. Some important topics covered in these talks are: **Problems of teenagers ,Career in Banking Sector, Entrepreneurship Development, Political Awareness, Career in Hardware and Networking, Interview Techniques, Self Employment, Personality Development** by Krunal Parekh, **Moral Values, SEBI, Solid State Lightning and Engergy Saving, Actual Functioning of Assembly, Career in Management an IT, Career after Graduation, Emotional Intelligence, Andhashraddha Nirmulan, Body Language, Career in CA, Self Employment by, Cyber and Economic Security, Women's Right, Sure steps to Success, GST, Career in Aviation Industry** etc.
- The college organizes workshops for students on **Soft Skill Development** and also arranges Guset Lecture series on '**Development of Employability Skills**', '**Conflict in Communication**' etc....
- Educational excursions are a common activity of all departments. **Political Science Department** takes the students to attend Winter Assembly at Vidhan Bhavan. **B.B.A Department** takes the students to industrial visits every year. (documents)
- Students excel in different sports event. **Inter collegiate cricket tournament** Winner Prizes are bagged by the college students often.
- The institute helps each student in exploring placement opportunities by inviting various companies for campus recruitment of students who are in the final year of the program. Companies like Wipro Technology visit the college for campus recruitment. Literally 30 students are placed under this activity in jobs. A big tour de force considering the fact that there is an absence of industry presence in the region.
- Parent Teacher meet is an innovative practice adopted by the institution for improving student teacher interaction and teacher –parent interaction. It helps in increasing classroom attendance and promoting healthy relationship between teacher-student-parents.
- Soft Skill Program tries to groom the students wherein teachers arrange different sessions to motivate and instill unique qualities amongst students. Some topics to note here are: **Motivation, Leadership qualities, Management qualities, Interview Skills and Interview techniques.**

VMV faculty has adopted a wide repertoire of innovative teaching methods. The new instructional strategies have been driven by a desire to create collaborative learning spaces, employ latest teaching technologies and devise effective evaluation tools for measuring learning outcomes. The underlying philosophy has been a student-centred approach.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

Information regarding the evaluation and assessment process is conveyed to the stakeholders in the following ways:

- Reforms are observed in terms of projects given to the students. Through the projects under teachers' guidance, the students expose themselves to the world of knowledge and benefitted at

large.

- To enhance the students' formative growth, the teachers give them topics on creative writing and research oriented topics for their projects.
- The topics are suggested to the students well in advance. While giving different topics to the students for projects, the teachers discuss and highlight some major concerns of the topic to be incorporated in the project.
- Suggested Bibliography is also given to the students to prepare their project. Internal assessment is based on the overall performance of the student in the academic session, attentiveness in the college and the responses he gives.
- Field visits are the routine feature of students' curriculum. After the field visit, students are asked to prepare report on the visit. That also contributes in their in depth knowledge.
- Every January, the students enthusiastically participate in Power Point Presentation Competition. Each teacher prepares and guides two or more than two students for the said competition. That also enhances the quality reform in the teaching-learning process.
- Students participate in seminars. This is the regular class-room activity observed round the year.
- Orals are intermittently taken by all the teachers in their respective classes.
- Teachers assess the answer sheets and analyze the scores with students and guide them for betterment. Mistakes are identified and resolved with some exam oriented smart tips to improve their scores in exam.
- Viva-voce is conducted by departments to give practice to students in consonance with the university pattern of practical exam.
- Teachers guide the students in the revaluation of papers in University Exams. They go through the photocopy of the answer book and guide the students if the paper is undervalued or not.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

The college has adopted the following measures of transparency and robustness in Internal Assessment.

- Students are well informed about the types of tests and examination schedule at the commencement of the session as well as time to time round the year. The time schedule of the periodic tests is displayed on the Students' notice board well in advance. Individual departments inform the students for tests / practicals / presentations.
- The college has streamlined a unique exam orientation program where the teachers orient the students for their exams.
- The college has a well crafted formative and summative mechanism of student assessment.
- The staff and the counselling committee address the social, psychological and personal problems of the students time to time so that students' summative performance is to be enhanced.
- College Examination Committee has been constituted to monitor and ensure the implementation and execution of evaluation system.
- Other than the regular schedule of the periodic tests and unit tests, the teachers conduct orals based on the portion/syllabus to maintain transparency.
- Before the actual University Exam, the college organizes orientation program on how to write exam

paper.

- College strictly follows the university norms and guidelines for awarding internal marks.
- Parent-teacher meets are held on regular basis to monitor their wards' progress.

The students lodge their grievances with the teacher, if unsolved, they meet the Heads. Head of the departments try to resolve the issues on their level. If in case there is a requirement of Principal sir's help, the principal readily help the students in resolving the issue.

The College, however, looks at 'students achievement' in broader sense to comprise all aspects of a holistic learning and not merely academic performance. After all the TEL program aims at producing graduates who can stand in the society by their own well equipped in creativity, scientific temper and communicative skills. To ensure Students' teamwork, leadership and creativity, college has crafted some pedagogical tools that are absent in traditional Evaluation methods. This has effected positive results.

To cite a few examples, students offering add-on and certificate courses are evaluated on the basis of the metrics designed by the course coordinators. Students are thus evaluated on the basis of CV writing, drafting letters, interview and group discussion skills. The students are appreciated and felicitated at Annual Prize Distribution of the college.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

The college takes prompt care of its students whenever required and takes suitable action to resolve the exam related issues of the students.

At the College Level

The grievances of the students, if any, are addressed at the departmental level. Any issue related to valuation are sorted out by the concerned teacher and the head of department. In fact, no such incident has been reported till the time of quoting this information.

At the University Level

- College takes cognizance of the students' grievances regarding the Internal Assessment scores.
- The principal also takes the serious note of each of the case and willingly gives declarations to the students (that they are the bona fide students) to resolve the problem efficiently in time.
- The challenges like undervalued/revaluation answer scripts are done in a very transparent manner. The students are asked to get the true copy of their answer sheet from the university. The photo copy is evaluated by the concerned teacher and he informs the student whether to challenge it or not within the stipulated time.
- In some special cases, the confidential record of internal assessment scores is also produced and provided to the student if required to resolve the issue of evaluated marks. The grievance of the

students regarding internal assessment marks to be sent to university is resolved with the Xerox copy of the internal assessment mark list. The staff supports and initiates in settling the issue.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Response:

Yes, the college adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE. Yes, the college adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE. The faculties frame annual teaching plans to ensure completion of the syllabus. The monthly annual teaching plan is made discreetly to prepare the students for CIE round the year. The departments prepare their annual activities by holding meetings to evolve new teaching practices. They also draw study map for the students that include talks/workshops, invited lectures based on curriculum to have modest appraisal of the students under CIE. The HRD administers workshops for the teachers to ensure their pedagogical progress and ICT enabled teaching. To groom the students for CIE in each academic year, the college has an efficient Examination committee that sets the time-table of all the unit-tests, viva-voce, terminals and project dates for submission. The committee is streamlined in the conduct of College exam. The students are timely informed about their unit tests and viva exams. The schedule is displayed on notice board, well in advance. The students are given reminders for submission of the projects time to time. Submission last dates are conveyed to the students through sms'. The college complies with two unit tests before winter vacation and two unit tests after winter vacation. The Examination committee organizes terminal exams in the middle of the session and Prelims at the end to check the students' efficacies for the University Exams. All the faculties involve rigorously in the smooth conduct of examination.

. The college has excellent infrastructure to support innovations, autonomous work and research. It has well-stocked libraries, well-equipped laboratories, independent workspaces for faculty members, separate and adequate technological amenities and support for any initiatives in innovation and research.

All departments and faculty members have separate access to computers and peripherals including printers, scanners, photocopiers and so on. The entire campus is wi-fi, and the departments also have additional high-speed internet connectivity through leased line nodes. The college subscribes to scores of print journals and is a member of INFLIBNET, which brings access to over 8500 international journals and over half a million e-books. The college provides support in terms of flexible work schedule, paid leave, relaxation in workload and assistance of technical and administrative staff for any endeavour in innovation and research.

In terms of human resources, the college has highly qualified and academically active faculty members, many of whom are members of various prestigious academic bodies, editors of journals, Ph. D. supervisors and advanced researchers in their own right. The college has research centre recognised by the affiliating

university in Commerce, and also has mechanisms and systems in place to promote and support research and innovation.

Because of these creative and innovative mindset; staff members of the computer department have developed several gadgets which are quite innovative in nature. For example, department has developed **Paperless, Digital, Interactive notice board**. Also, gadgets and software are designed to conduct the **Fastest Finger First** round in the quiz competition. Similarly, a **Portable Projector System** is developed which runs on inverter and uses TV as monitor. Since these are all unique products so college is in the process of getting patents for these products.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities in the neighbourhood community in terms of impact and sensitising students to social issues and holistic development during the last five years

NSS Activities

The NSS volunteers of the college have worked with villages, slums, and voluntary agencies to complete 120 hours of regular activities every academic year. The college adopted the village Khapri in 2012. Later, it adopted the village Pawangaon from 2014 to 2017.

The following activities were carried out by the NSS volunteers with the village community.

- The volunteers took out a rally on 'De-addiction' in the village.
- The NSS students surveyed the village and located places to be cleaned by them.
- The cleanliness drive in the village was regularly followed by tree Plantation programme in the adopted villages.
- The NSS students also took out a 'Vriksha Dindi' to spread awareness about tree plantation.
- A Lecture on 'blind faith eradication' was organized to educate the villagers about irrationalities of the superstitious notions harbored by them.
- An expert on the 'Waste Water Management' was specially invited to interact with the villagers. The theme of interaction was 'Saving water and Saving Life'.
- The NSS volunteers, along with the personnel's of the District Collector's office, spread awareness in the adopted village about the citizen's right to exercise one's vote.
- The NSS also endeavored to initiate the process of making students voter identity cards in association with the Collector Office.
- The NSS volunteers interacted with the villagers about the benefits of wearing a helmet during driving and also the necessity of carrying driving license and following traffic rules.
- A survey was conducted by NSS students in the village on public behavior towards the use of toilets..

Other Extension Activities

A Blood Donation Camp, with the help of Shri Hedgewar Blood Bank, is organized on large scale in the college every year. Hemoglobin Test of students, teachers, residents living in the vicinity of the college, and parents of the students is conducted during the Blood Donation Camp.

The college, in association with the Rotaract Club, addresses the health needs of the students, guardians and the residents in the vicinity of the college by the organizing 'Bone Mineral Density checkup camps, and Rubella Vaccination camp every year.

Visit to the Old Age Homes is regularly organized. The students interact with the inmates and fulfill their needs by providing items of daily needs and medicines.

The students of the college participated in the 'Save Food Campaign'. They took out a rally in the nearby area of the college spreading awareness about the issue.

The college has signed an MOU with an NGO 'Renovatio', which, along with students carry out the extension activities like the green garbage disposal drive and e-waste disposal drive. Other extension activities like yoga training for orphanage students and food donation to students of platform schools are also carried out by the NGO, in association with the college.

'Dr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam Wachan Katta', an endeavor by the college library, aims at improving the reading habit of the people living in the vicinity of the college.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

- The institution has a healthy ambient with 31 classrooms for teaching and learning all equipped with desks, benches, fans, tube lights and a crosswind atmosphere for sound learning by students.
- The college campus has an area of 7101 sqm and has 4 floors with an elevator for divyang students. Apart from that, each floor has drinking water facility with a Reverse Osmosis plant for pure water circulation which is located on the fourth floor.
- The campus has large separate parking spaces for girls, boys and the staff. There are also common rooms for girls and canteen facilities on the campus. While a large amount of energy consumption is taken care of through solar energy, the college has more than enough generator back-up for power supply in case of breakages. The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games and well-equipped gym.
- There are in all 13 laboratories comprising of :
 - 1.Three Computer Science Laboratories for BSc, BCA and BCCA students (for the full duration of programme)
 - 2.Chemistry Laboratory for B.Sc programme.
 - 3.Physics Laboratory for the B.Sc programme
 - 4.UGC Network Resource Centre for access to the internet for faculty, research students and students of Degree and Post Graduate students.
 - 5.Language Laboratory for learning the English Language via Language learning software like Zybros.
 - 6.Electronics Laboratory for the students of Post Graduate and Degree students.
 - 7.M.Sc (Chemistry) Laboratory
 - 8.M.Sc (Physics) laboratory
 - 9.B. Voc Drama room for Acting and Stage Craft
 - 10.B. Voc. Studio
 - 11.B. Voc. Makeup Room
 - 12.Computer Laboratory in MCA department
 - 13.Language Laboratory in MCA Department.
- All the classrooms are well equipped with adequate furniture and blackboards for teaching purposes.
- There is a notice board outside each classroom to highlight the developments in the classrooms, e.g. timetable, program of events, if any, in the classroom.
- All laboratories have an IT-enabled infrastructure with LCD projectors for e-learning.
- The computing equipment in network resource centre with 15 computers help the students to access the internet for e-learning, solving e-exercises delivered by concerned teachers.
- The Language laboratory has 25 computers for the students to learn spoken the English language through listening and viewing videos offered by Zybros language learning software.

- There are 60 computers in MCA laboratory for access to students for their respective courses related to computer practicals and computer sciences. There are 3 computers in the office of MCA department with network connected printers. There are 60 computers in Computer Science Department connected to 2 printers. All the computers are connected to the internet. There are 10 computers in the office running with Synchronic software.
- The library has 10 computer running on software like OPAC, Inlibnet and Softlib software.

4.1.2 The institution has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor, outdoor) gymnasium, yoga centre etc. and cultural activities

Response:

- In the third floor, the college has fully Air-Conditioned Auditorium, with an area of 80 X 60 feet, established in 2013, with a capacity for 400 people is used for college and intercollege level cultural activities. The auditorium is also used for Yoga exercises and Yoga classes are held free of charge on Saturdays and Sundays.
- There is a Stage & Drama Practice hall (Room no. 312) on the third floor with all facilities for dramatics. Students and teachers of Bachelor of Vocational Studies (B.Voc) course use these facilities.
- There is one seminar hall (Room No. 108) and a full-fledged auditorium with ICT enabled facilities and a smart board. In seminar hall, the students arrange debate and other co-curricular activities.
- There is a Volleyball court (established in 1970) of 18 X 9 feet, Kabaddi court for 12.5 X 10 feet, Khokho Court of 30 X 60 feet (established in 1970) and Badminton court of 18 X 9 feet. The college has a vast playground in the area of 100 metres by 50 metres for outdoor games.
- There is an outdoor auditorium called Piyushbhai Thakkar Sabhagruha on the south side of the institution for conduction of Stage shows, a Cultural programme from special visiting film personalities for the display and training of their art.

Policy on Procurement of Infrastructure Equipment:

- The Institution follows a systematic procedure for procurement of equipment for the purchase and maintenance of equipment.
- The institution asks various agencies dealing with infrastructure sale and servicing for their quotations regarding the purchase of equipment.
- There is a comparative tabulation of the pricing of the goods that will be delivered to our institution.
- A fair and better pricing which suits the interests of the students in particular and institution in general for procurement of infrastructure goods is being dealt with.

Annual Maintenance Related Work:

- This is also followed by the signing of an Annual Maintenance contract for the delivered goods which needs constant running and servicing support.
- The furniture in the classroom is constantly checked for its usability. Defective furniture is repaired as per Annual Maintenance Contract that is given to the firm dealing with repair and renovation.
- At the end of each financial year various agencies from whom the Institution has purchased goods dealing with Infrastructure, IT facilities and IT maintenance are contact and a new AMC is signed with them with certain terms and conditions.
- It is under the clauses of the AMC that the infrastructure is maintained properly for its in-house upkeep working condition.
- There is a maintenance committee comprising of senior faculty professors of the institution to whom the working of various facilities is reported.
- The committee keeps track of the equipment and takes decision for the upkeep and maintenance of the equipment by recommending the matters to the Principal of the institution.
- The funds sanctioned by UGC in relation to the purchase of equipment are also utilized for the AMC for continuous running of equipment and facilities. All the equipment are in constant running condition and thus are under full utilization.
- A similar procedure is followed to maintain the sports equipment for its proper working and usage so that no sports person is injured during his/her exercise in the Gym or in the playground.

5.3.2 Presence of an active Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution

Response:

The Student Council was regularly constituted by nominating students as per Maharashtra State University Act in 2012-13 and 2013-14. However, the university elections were banned after 2013-14, and the college could not form the Student Council in 2014-15 and onwards.

The MS University act mandated that a class representative from each class be nominated on merit basis. Thus there were 23 class representatives. In addition to these class representatives, one representative each from NCC, NSS, sport, culture and two lady representatives were also nominated on the Student Council. All these chosen representatives would then elect a University Representative from the college.

The Student Council would take the initiative to organize extracurricular activities in the college with the help of teachers. These students were part of Study Circles of all the departments and would carry out extracurricular activities of the departments. After 2013-14, when the Student Council could not be constituted formally, the meritorious students, nevertheless, were incorporated in various departments' Study Circles to carry out extra-academic activities. They are nominated as president, secretary of the Study Circles. They would then take the lead to organize students and conduct cultural and extra academic programs of the college. They would coordinate among students and teachers for the successful conduct of the programs of the college.

The study circle students are always instrumental in the success of the grand 'Late J. M. Thakar Memorial Intercollegiate Debate Competition held every year in the college where students from different colleges in and around Nagpur participate.

The meritorious students were also incorporated in the student editorial board of the annual college magazine "Shabdangan" to assist the editor of the magazine. The students editorial board used to be of immense help in the publication of the annual magazine.

Mission

The emphasis is on developing right attitudes and values of discipline, dedication and commitment among its members.

Nature of governance, perspective plans and participation of teachers in decision making bodies

- College practices participative management through decentralization of responsibilities and duties of staff members.
- The Principal delegates all the academic and non academic powers based on policy to the committees headed by respective conveners.
- The college delegates authority and provides operational autonomy in all areas of academic performance, decision taking and implementation of plans and policies in curricular programs.
- The college provides autonomy to IQAC convener to organize competitions, guest lectures, seminars, conferences, workshops, and faculty development programs by inviting external experts and resource persons.
- The HODs of the department perform the academic programmes with coordination and support of faculty members and student representatives.
- The departments decide the requirements for whole academic year like equipments, books and infrastructural facilities.
- The convener of Placement committee freely conducts training programs for job opportunities and invites the experts and resource persons for placement training.
- A total of 19 certificate courses are offered which include spoken English, soft skill development, Business Correspondence etc. Computer courses like C- language, Web site designing, Hardware and Networking are also available for professional development of students.
- Various co-curricular and extracurricular activities are organized to nourish special talent of students. These activities are focused towards community and social service. Students are encouraged to raise funds for welfare of orphanage and old age home.
- Computers along with internet facility at nominal fee are available for students.
- Full equipped Library with large number of books on various subjects is available. Journals, magazines, daily news papers are also made available to students and teachers.

- English language lab facility has been started for students which enables them to learn English language easily.
- Economically backward students are given bicycles and free bus passes.
- Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners to improve academic achievements.
- Health camp like Rubella vaccination, Bone mineral density test and Hemoglobin test of girl students, stake holders and residents of nearby areas is organized.
- All the above plans are directed to meet the vision & mission of the college.

6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Response:

For smooth and effective functioning of various administrative and academic activities, the college has adopted participative management practice through decentralization of responsibilities and duties of staff members. The Principal delegates all the academic and non academic powers based on policy to the committees headed by respective conveners through IQAC. The respective committees formulate common working procedures and entrust the effective implementation. The convener manages the day to day activities of the committee and keeps a track of curricular and co-curricular activities in the college. All committees have operational autonomy to devise their programs and implementation procedure. Each teaching staff is member of many committees with at least being convener of one committee. Membership

The Admissions Committee is composed of 11 members appointed by the Principal including a convener and members from each faculty.

Committee Process

- The committee meets between April and August frequently as required.
- Members are assigned to review in advance the expected demand of different discipline / subject and expected cut off.

- Admission request are considered only on the basis of merit.
- The committee on the basis of review of previous year trend may submit request for additional seat allocation.

Duties & Responsibilities

- To work out intake capacity in various courses, based on the resources available and permission granted by RTM Nagpur University.
- To ensure all necessary arrangements are in place for distribution of prospectus, registration of forms, seating arrangements for staff, students, parents etc.
- To finalize the starting and closing date of admission.
- To ensure display eligibility for various courses and rules & conditions of admission.
- To prepare and display merit list.
- To guide students about Migration Certificate, Eligibility Certificate etc.
- To prepare and circulate final list of admission
- To interact and guide the students for best option available for their academic development.
- To ensure that admission process meet pre defined criteria in terms of qualification & other prescribed eligibilities.
- To verify the authenticity of mark sheets and certificates.
- The Admissions Committee has complete autonomy and is not to be influenced by any means or individuals. Attempts to influence the decisions of committee are reported without delay to the Principal.

Function

The Admissions Committee formulate and recommend the policies for student admission for approval of Principal and admit students in the College through processes based upon approved policies, such policies relate to

- eligibility criteria and qualification for the admission seekers
- Procedures for prospectus / application distribution and submission.
- procedures for the review of received applications procedures for the allotment and enrollment of students

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Perspective/Strategic plan and Deployment documents are available in the institution

Response:

The college management gives liberal freedom to the Principal together with the Perspective Plan committee. They regularly meet and take necessary steps to formulate and implement strategic plans of the college. They invite suggestions from teaching staff and to study the impulses of the institute in general and take steps for further perspective plans.

Implementation of Perspective /Strategy Plan - B. Voc

Under the scheme of Skills Development based higher education leading to Bachelor of Vocation (B.Voc.) Degree under NSQF, College submitted two proposals to The Director B.C.U.D. RTMNU Nagpur in specialization B.Voc. (Acting) & B.Voc. (Theatre and Stage craft) on 23.05.2014. NOC to the same was given by BCUD on 28.05.2014 vide their letter No BCUD/P/2014/444. The UGC approved the above courses vide their letter No F.2-103/2014.

- The courses are in operation since Oct 2014 and the first batch stands graduated in July 2017.
- It aims at developing the skills of its students in the field of Dramatic Art and is based on the assumption that the technique of Acting and Stage Craft (Make-up, Lighting, Costume, Setting, Audio-Video Editing etc.) can be learned by conscious study of principles of Dramatic Art and their Persistent application.
- Bachelor of Vocation is an academic course with multiple exit options. A student can opt for an exit from the course after successful completion two semesters and acquire a Diploma, after successful completion of four Semesters a student is entitled to an Advanced Diploma, only after successful completion of six semesters the student is awarded a Degree.

Advisory Board

Advisory Board includes eminent personalities of Theater and entertainment world. Mr. Paresh Rawal, Mrs. Kiran Kher, Mr. Chandraprakash Dwivedi, Mr. Vikram Gokhale, Mr. Girish Oak are names of par excellence in their respective fields.

Infrastructure

- The infrastructure for the experimental practice of the principles of Dramatic Art has been created in the college in the form of a practice hall with a stage.
- The Classroom Dramatic Productions are showcased on this stage
- A well equipped Make-up room with mirrors with make-up materials, is constructed for imparting training in Theatrical make-up.
- An Advanced Audio-Video Editing unit is installed for imparting the training of Sound and Video Editing to Bachelor of Vocation Students.
- Stage Lights and electrical equipments for Dramatic Productions are also a part of the infrastructural facilities available for the course.
- Changing rooms and store rooms form an integral part of the infrastructure of B.Voc.

In addition to regular Theory and Practical classes B. Voc. student's get opportunity to participate in Theatre workshops and Guest Lectures sessions, which enable them to interact with eminent Artists, Technicians and professionals of Theatre & Films.

A full Length play "Mahatma ka Intazar" was performed by the students in the Deshpande hall and was highly appreciated by eminent theatre professionals. The production was widely covered by the electronic as well as print media.

6.2.2 Organizational structure of the institution including governing body, administrative setup, and functions of various bodies, service rules, procedures, recruitment, promotional policies as well as grievance redressal mechanism

Response:

The Principal of the college is the administrative Head of the institution. The Institute has various committees to coordinate curricular, co-curricular & extracurricular matters. Council of staff members which includes all Heads of Departments gives suggestion to the Principal on all academic matters including the maintenance of discipline. The Management representatives visit frequently and discuss the issues related to college development, administration, appointment and infrastructural needs. The Principal and staff provide information and suggestions regarding academic and infrastructural development with the Local Management Committee (LMC) / College Development Committee (CDC). In the meeting of CDC the responsibilities are defined and communicated to the staff through the principal. The principal communicates the responsibilities to head of the departments and convener of various committees. The instructions and responsibilities given by the top Management. The College has a team of leaders in all the departments. The decisions and policies related to students, academic as well as co-curricular, are mutually discussed by the team, and decisions are immediately taken and implemented for the benefit of the students. Faculty members conduct various development activities, seminars, workshops, industrial visits for the direct development of the students, and report for the same is submitted to the principal and head of the department. College has grievance redressal mechanism for the staff members. Internal Complaints Committee is also functional. All the procedures, rules and regulations related to recruitment, promotional policies are well defined and are maintained at the College office and IQAC office.

The Nagpur Gujarati Mandal is the management for the institution and holds the final authority in all internal matters. The college is governed by the College Development Council (formerly Local Management Committee) consisting of the representative of the parent society, local community, industry, social workers, the teaching staff, the non-teaching staff and the administration. This CDC is entrusted with the overall management of the college. Within the college the Principal is the institutional head and is responsible for managing the day-to-day affairs of the college. Three kinds of personnel - technical, administrative and teaching - are in place in the college to cater to the workload needs of the respective domains. The Academic wing is managed through the heads of various departments and numerous academic committees and coordinators, while the administrative side is managed through the registrar/superintendent and various administrative committees. The service rules, procedures of recruitment and promotional policies are all governed by the relevant legislations of the government of Maharashtra, especially the Maharashtra Public Universities Act, the ordinances and statutes of the affiliating university (RTM Nagpur University) and the overarching norms and regulations of the UGC. - The performance appraisal system proves to bring out qualitative output in academic performance of the college.
- Performance appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines of U.G.C.
- It is also a process to facilitate career advancement of teachers, so it is a part of continuing professional development or career advancement.
- As per U.G.C. regulations 2010 it is mandatory for all college teachers to prepare Performance Based Appraisal in the prescribed format for career advancement.
- Based on the teacher's self-assessment, API scores are proposed for (a) teaching related activities; (b) domain knowledge; (c) participation in examination and evaluation; (d) contribution to innovative teaching, new courses etc.
- API scores are proposed for co curricular and extension activities and professional development related contribution.
- API scores are also proposed for research and academic contributions which encourage teachers to go for more research activities.
- After receiving the outcome of performance appraisal report of the staff by Principal, the appraisal reports are analyzed and identified the strength and weakness of faculty. Adequate measures are taken to improve quality of teaching learning process.
- Self appraisal helps to figure out strengths and weaknesses of the teachers. It allows one to take an honest look at oneself and to evaluate and document one's own performance
- It is also a process to facilitate career advancement of teachers, so it is a part of continuing professional development or career advancement.
- The performance of non-teaching staff is assessed in terms of work ethics, discipline, performance, punctuality, integrity and devotion to work. On the basis of above mention criteria their performance is evaluated by LMC and if found satisfactory, they get promoted to next higher grade of pay.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

College conducts the internal as well as external financial audits regularly. The audit is carried out by both internal and external agencies. Audits of the college as a whole are carried out every year without fail. The first instance of audit is the college accounts department which prepares the draft audited statements and ensures that all financial matters and transactions are in consonance with the applicable norms and regulations. In the second instance, every year these accounts and transactions are audited by professional and licensed chartered accountant agencies, which carry out the audit independently and certify if the financial matters have followed requisite norms or not and point out discrepancies if any.

In addition to these general overall audits, the college carries out regular audits of the financial matters associated with specific schemes, grants and projects. These audited statements and utilization certificates are regularly sent to the state government, the funding agencies and regulatory authorities like the UGC.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The college receives limited amounts of grants from the UGC aimed at particular academic and developmental objectives. It also receives salary grants from the state government but only for the staff employed on grant-in-aid posts. However, these funds do not cover all the financial needs of the college, and are not adequate to ensure good maintenance and continuous growth of the college. It therefore employs a range of strategies to mobilize funds and to save funds through optimum utilization of resources.

The college is availed by government / private organisation for different exams on college holidays / Sundays etc... The revenue generated through these exams is utilized by college for developmental activities.

The scholarships and free ships from the government are periodically received for the students. Further the grants received from UGC are strictly used for the purpose for which they are granted.

The college also runs some self-financing courses which are quite popular. By maintaining a good standard of these courses, the college has been able to attract good number of students to many of these courses. There are also other sources like the alumni and the former staff members of the college who contribute some funds to various initiatives of the college every year. The college also firmly believes that funds saved are also funds generated and hence tries to ensure that there is minimum wastage of resources and that every kind of resource is used optimally to its fullest potential. This is achieved in different ways such as sharing and pooling of facilities, equipment and resources, reuse and recycle of resources wherever possible and minimizing the needs of using any resource as far as possible.

Audit is done by registered chartered accountant at the end of each financial year.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

IQAC plays an important role in designing, framing and implementing the policies of the college which are planned as per NAAC guidelines. Important contributions are mentioned below.

- IQAC contributed to designing and producing a revamped teacher diary to cover various aspects teacher work right from teaching plan, lesson plan, leave record, conducting various activities, paper presentation and participation in conferences etc. So from teachers diary one can get the complete profile of the teacher.
- IQAC supported various departments with the process of formalizing the agreements and understandings they had with different agencies and institutions for programs such as faculty and student exchange program, collaborative research work etc...
- the IQAC was instrumental in introducing several short term and add on courses.
- With the initiative of the IQAC post graduate courses in PHY, CHE and MATHS started from the session 2016-17.
- In addition to this, the IQAC coordinated and prepared the Handbook on Code of Couduct for the students and also for the staff to formally acknowledge the commitment of the college, its students and the staff to certain core values and ethical principles.
- The IQAC also contributed to strengthening the teaching learning processes by constantly working with the teachers and students on expanding the use of ICT in teaching-learning, augmenting infrastructure and facilities for the same, building up online and e-resources, reforming and innovating evaluation practices and promoting beyond-class interactions with students especially using social media platforms.
- The IQAC also regularly coordinated with the staff, students and alumni in collating ideas and needs for regular improvements of the campus facilities and infrastructure. As an important means of this, the IQAC developed reformed instruments of feedback collection and created ways of gathering online feedback from teachers, students, alumni and parents.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms

Response:

The college conducts a periodic review of the teaching-learning processes and the learning outcomes. Monitoring is carried out in phases.

- First is the feedback which is collected from the students twice in the year, at the end of each semester. The feedback is collected both on the courses they attend and the teachers teaching them

as well as the infrastructure and facilities available for teaching and learning. Feedback is also added from a few alumni and parents. The feedback provides useful information while reviewing the teaching learning processes and the college plans.

- The second source is the data on the performance of students at the internal assessment activities and the final university examinations. This data gives a good idea in terms of teaching practices, student progress and the learning outcomes.
- The third useful source of inputs for review is the data from teacher performance appraisal and teachers' experiences and observations.
- Taking into account all these kinds of inputs the college carries out periodic review of its teaching learning processes, its strategies and methods of operation and its short and long term plans.
- The review happens at the departmental level, where each department takes stock of their teaching-learning activities and the outcomes from them. The IQAC gets feeding from them on this which helps the IQAC prepare comments and suggestions for all. Mostly these topics and issues are taken up at the staff council meetings, but occasionally also at departmental meetings.
- The IQAC also plays a significant role in preparing the annual academic calendar, the schedules and plans for the continuous internal evaluation and the plans for co-curricular activities.
- The IQAC also helps the college administration and individual departments to regularly monitor the changing needs in terms of infrastructure, resources and equipment, in view of the periodic changes in the curricular structures and syllabus contents. Periodic review is also carried out at the meetings of the heads of departments with the principal, at which they share their observations and experiences with each other and collectively plan further actions.

6.5.5 Incremental improvements made during the preceding five years (*in case of first cycle*) Post accreditation quality initiatives (*second and subsequent cycles*)

Response:

The enhancement in the college over the past five years may be broadly summarised as follows.

- The college has significantly improved its library stock and added a large number of e-resources as well. Through the INFLIBNET membership now the staff and student have access to over 8500 journals and 8 lakh books.
- Laboratories have also been upgraded with ne equipment added to them. There has been upgradation of the parking, disabled facilities, departmental spaces, the seminar hall, all computer centers and cultural facilities.
- A number of toilets have been added and the old ones upgraded.
- Expansion of ICT: The college has continuously added to its ICT infrastructure. For example, the internet speed from 256 kbps to 80 mbps, the entire campus is now wi-fi enabled and large number of ICT peripherals are available in the college.
- Most of the processes and functions in the college offices, library, accounts section and student services has been computerized and automated. This has made the work faster and more transparent and better manageable.
- The college introduced several add-on courses to impart employability and life skills to the students.
- It also introduced skills based graduate programmes like B. Voc in Acting, Theater and stage-craft.
- College also started number of post graduate courses like M.Com. MA in English, Hindi and Economics.
- In 2016-17 session college started MSc. Course in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics.
- The college also launched Ph. D. research centres in commerce.
- More ICT in teaching-learning: The expansion of ICT facilities & e-resources has led to remarkably greater use of ICT in teaching-learning. Teachers use a wide range of teaching methods and use

multimedia and e-resources for the purpose.

- All classrooms now have wi-fi access. The spread of internet connectivity has led to the use of online resources and study materials by teachers and students and also much more student-teacher interaction and support, especially using social media platforms.
- The college has significantly improved the maintenance of infrastructure and facilities with the hiring of professional agencies. It has now a huge security network with nearly 50 CCTV cameras and professional security agency guarding the campus.
- Developmental Initiatives: The college held a large number of staff development activities and organised quality assurance initiatives. It also considerably improved its community outreach activities, Alumni association activities and linkages and collaborations.
- The last five years have also seen remarkable increase in research studies and publications, including the launch of a multidisciplinary research journal.
- The college has substantially jacked up solar energy production with a bulk of consumption shifted to solar energy. Consumption is further reduced through extensive use of LED lights. Other importance green initiatives include rain water harvesting, waste management, compost pits, recycling of waste water, reuse of resources and less-paper procedures.

1. Safety and Security

1. The discipline committee has been working for resolving all the security issues by keeping a close watch and by giving parental guidance to all girl students. Phone numbers of members of discipline committee are displayed at prominent places in the college premises to address problems relating to **sexual harassment**. **CCTV cameras** have been installed in every corridor of the college for the safety of the students (especially girl students). **Patrolling guards** are deputed at each floor for the safety of students. **Help line numbers** are displayed at prominent places to enable the girl students and faculties to make call at times of emergency. **Complaint boxes** have been installed at every floor to register complaint if any.. **Grievance and Anti-ragging cells** have been constituted in the college which enable the students to directly communicate with the concerned authority. Work shop on self-defence such as **Karate workshop** is conducted since last three years to impart safety techniques to girl students. To ensure the health of girl students various health camps such as **Rubella vaccination camp**, **Hemoglobin checkup camp** are organized every year in the college.

1. Counseling

1. Girl students are informed and encouraged at the beginning of every session to confide their emotional and psychological problems at informal level to the counselor appointed especially for this purpose. The information shared by them is kept confidential. The counseling cell consists of trained and experienced faculties who deal with academic as well as non-academic grievances of the students. Eminent faculties are entrusted with the responsibility of creating awareness about suicide prevention amongst the youth. Common issues regarding life (love failure, premarital affairs, caste) are discussed with students so that they can understand the issues related to them, . Guest lectures by reputed doctors, psychologist have been organized to create awareness about the signs and symptoms of depression and other psychological issues.. Counseling cell is also responsible for the welfare and development of the students. As the students admitted in the college generally belong to **weak socio-economic background**, academic counseling is also provided by the counselor. The trained staff resolves the economic issues of the students through students welfare committee constituted for this purpose. Career counseling is also provided to the students through placement committee. The women cell organizes various interactive sessions and guest lectures on gender issues of the students.

2. Common Room

1. The college has a common room for the benefit of the girl students. The room is equipped with basic facilities such as bed, proper sitting arrangement, curtains for privacy, mirror for grooming. Cupboard for storing cloths to be changed during raining season, first aid box with basic medicines needed at times of emergency and facilities for various indoor games(Carom and Chess) for recreation of students. The common room is just opposite the girls wash room for the convenience of the students.

Waste Management steps including:

1. Solid waste management

The Bio- degradable and non –biodegradable waste is segregated by use of color bins. Red and blue bins are installed at each floor for disposal of waste. Blue bin is used for biodegradable waste and red bin for non- bio degradable waste. Compost pit is created in the college campus for Vermicomposting of bio degradable waste. Plastic bags are banned in the college premises. We have a Paper shredder in the college for disposal of waste paper. The college disposes off non- biodegradable waste through Nagpur Municipal Corporation. The college has also installed sanitary napkin incinerators in the wash rooms for disposal of used sanitary napkins. Plastic cups for tea are replaced by biodegradable cups in the canteen. The College is actively involved in making students aware about about cleanliness of lakes and water bodies at prominent places in the city through the Rotrat Club, NCC and NSS of the college during Ganesh Visarjan by conducting Nirmalya Visarjan Drives The blank papers and cardboard of records of one batch are reused for another batch, thus minimizing the waste. The college has hired a housekeeping agency to maintain the cleanliness of building and campus.

2. Liquid waste management

Waste chemicals generated in the chemistry laboratory are properly disposed off. Students are encouraged to perform micro scale experiments in order to minimize the quantity of hazardous chemicals. College takes care to reduce and eliminate wastage of water through timely repair and proper maintenance of water storage and distribution system. Leakage in taps is identified and proper plumbing procedures are carried

out to prevent wastage of water.

3. E-Waste management

College has tied up with an NGO (Renovatio) for e-waste disposal drive. Students actively participate in the drive and collect e-waste from nearby areas which is then properly disposed off. Best out of e-waste competition are conducted by the college to enhance the creativity of the students. Students are encouraged to make creative articles like key-chain, photo frame, containers, pen holders out of CDs, Floppies, sensors, LEDs and RAM.

7.1.6 Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

Response:

College faces water limitations during the summer season. The college uses rainwater harvesting to its advantage. Since there is heavy rainfall during the monsoon, the falling water is directly collected in open tanks and reused for a variety of purposes. While some of the harvested rainwater satisfies the needs of the college, a lot of it also goes into recharging the ground water and rejuvenate the depleting ground water resources. Thanks to rainwater harvesting, the wells of nearby area maintain substantial stock of water throughout the year, even when water tables go down in summer. The harvested rainwater is utilized mainly for external uses in the campus lawns and the gardens, as well as sprinkling of playgrounds and preparation of fields. A part of the rainwater is also routinely used in the laboratories for a variety of purposes. Harvested rainwater also contributes to the well water stock, which serves as the main source of water used in washbasins, toilets and other tap points.

Most of the students coming to college use bicycles as a mode of transportation. Students are provided with **free bus passes** by the college for their commutation to the college. Students are also provided with **free bicycles** every year. In order to ensure cleaner air, the college has prohibited the entry of heavy vehicles inside the college premises. Guest lectures and power point presentations are organized to sensitize staff and students on environment and sustainable development.

- **Plastic free campus**

Plastic cups for tea are replaced by **biodegradable cups** in the canteen. Plastic free zone is created in the college, thus encouraging the students to use paper or jute bags. The college In association with NGO (Renovatio) has conducted ban on plastic drive in the nearby area.

- **Paperless office**

The College encourages online submission of assignments by the students to minimize the use of paper and also to promote the use of technology. Notification about meetings, instructions to staff and students is communicated through SMS and e-mails, thus moving towards paperless functioning. Reuse of cardboard and blank paper of record books by the students in next semester.

Digital notice board have been installed displaying notices, pictures of the event and other important information to the students.

- **Green landscaping with trees and plants**

Oxygen Park is developed in one of the areas in the premises where plants such as Areca Palm, Aloe-vera, Neem, Tulsi have been planted to increase the oxygen content in the air. The college makes sincere efforts to promote **carbonneutralization** on the campus by strictly adhering to the policy of non -burning of waste in the premises. Regular plantation of sapling is carried out in the premises through NSS, NCC, campus beautification committee and Rotrat Club. College has adopted a village (Pawangaon) where regular plantation drives and cleanliness drives are conducted by the students of NSS. **1000 saplings** were planted in the premises of Raj Bhavan by Students of NSS and NCC. Practice of welcoming guests by gifting saplings instead of bouquet. Has been adopted by the college.

The institution maintains complete transparency in its financial, academic, administrative and auxiliary functions. We have a system of internal checking in the office section. Accounts are audited by internal auditors at regular intervals. We have a three tier system of checking the financial transactions .At the initial level the financial transactions are checked by the concerned clerk, followed by chief accountant and then by the registrar and finally by principal. The institute's annual report and audited financial statement are made available for the inspection of the government authorities.

Academic transparency is maintained right at the time of admission of students. Merit list of the students is displayed and admissions are strictly done on Merit basis. Records of unit test, terminal examination and viva voce are maintained by the examination committee and are made available for inspection of stakeholders throughout the session .Code of conduct of students and faculties is uploaded on the website. Question bank related to each subject, as per the syllabus, is made available on the college website. The course coverage of each subject is closely monitored by the head of department of concerned stream.

Administrative transparency is maintained through complete disclosure of proceedings of the institute to the faculties as well as the students by the administrative staff. Faculties have access to the government regulations forwarded by the State government, UGC or legal cell of Nagpur university. Our Institute adopts decentralization of administrative functioning. Different committees are formed to take care of different activities. Staff (teaching and nonteaching)representation on the LMC along with the members of management impart transparency in the college administration. Appointments are done as per the directives of the government. RTI compliance is strictly adhered to. Information regarding various department is displayed on the notice board through infographics

RUBELLA VACCINATION CAMP FOR GIRL STUDENTS, STAKEHOLDERS AND RESIDENTS OF NEARBY AREA

2] OBJECTIVE

- 1.To Prevent fetal rubella infection and subsequent congenital rubella syndrome(CRS) In new born
- 2.To prevent girl students from the ill effects associated with the rubella virus
- 3.To prevent rubella infection in girls during early pregnancy

3] THE CONTEXT

Rubella is caused by a virus from the genus Rubivirus. Symptoms include low grade fever, respiratory problems, and most normally a rash of pink color on body. A woman who contracts rubella infection during pregnancy can pass the infection to the developing foetus that may cause congenital defects in the child or even miscarriage. Rubella can be prevented by administering a vaccine before marriage.

4] THE PRACTICE

The Rubella vaccination camp is organised every year for the girl student of the college. Renowned gynecologists of east Nagpur Dr. Kumud thakkar, Dr Shobha Gandhi administers the vaccine to the girls and also orient the students about the rubella virus.

5] EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

Approximately 200 to 225 girls of college and nearby areas administered the vaccine in 2016. The number of girls administering the vaccine is increasing every year. Students of Rotract club are actively involved in creating awareness in the locality about Rubella vaccine. Pamphlets of Rubella are distributed in the nearby areas.

6] THE PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED & RESOURCE REQUIRED

Due to poor socio- economic background of the students, it was difficult to convince the parent about the usefulness of the vaccine. Parents were skeptical about the side effects of the vaccine.

Institution endeavors to provide skill based training to the students of the college on ICT application through ICT training programs conducted by the computer department. Basic concepts of MS office are taught to the students. Power point presentation competition are conducted by the research department every year to enhance the presenting skills of the students.

Problems Encountered
