

The emphasis is on developing right attitudes and value of discipline, dedication and commitment among its members.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Admission procedure to all the programmes is through MIS including printing of I-cards of students of all the courses.

Correspondence, invitation, notices are sent through SMS facility of MIS.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college is affiliated to R.T.M. Nagpur University. So the curriculum prescribed by the University for all the programmes is followed by the college. However, the faculties who are the members of Board of Studies are actively involved in Curriculum Development as and when it is required by the university.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

1.Each faculty member prepares exhaustive teaching plan for the course module for every session.

2. The implementation of the teacher's teaching plan/module and the conduction of his/her classes as per the time-table are assessed by the IQAC/Principal/HOD at regular intervals.

3. Many activities were conducted to enrich and supplement the curricula like guest lectures, industrial visits, projects etc.

4. Faculty made use of computers, internet, LCD and interactive board to enhance the teaching-learning process.

5. NPTL videos are often used to explain the difficult to concept.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Regular conduct of unit tests.
- Briefing and workshop on preparation of university exam.
- Students seminars are arranged because it is proved that retention power is maximum when you explain to someone else.
- Students who perform well in the exam are rewarded in the class itself so that the other students get motivated to improve their performance in the next test.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Research committee conducted workshop on "Synopsis Writing" on 12th Oct 2014.
- IQAC organised 8 day national workshop on research methodology and was attended by 97 participants.
- College also conducts PET exam organised by the RTM Nagpur University and which is an entrance exam for the candidates who want to do Ph.D.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- College library is rich in collection of reference books, text books, periodicals, magazines, digital resources, and audio visual materials.
- Most of the Departments have their own library to cater to immediate requirements.
- Book bank facility is availed to the students wherein the students can issue more than one book from the month of December till the exam clearance time.
- Book deposit scheme is practised by the library during examination period to help the needy students to use books by depositing a nominal amount which is refundable after the books are returned.
- Prizes was awarded to 'Best Library User' and 'Best Book Reviewer' among the students.
- To promote ICT based teaching and learning short term training programmes are conducted for teachers to enhance and upgrade teaching skills.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Short Term Training programmes are organized by the college for the improvement in Teaching skills and the soft skills of the faculty members. Also 4 teachers granted leave to attend Summer School / Orientation / Refresher course.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The College appoints its faculty and staff purely on merit basis.

1ST BEST PRACTICE

RUBELLA VACCINATION CAMP FOR COLLEGE GIRLS AND RESIDENTS OF NEARBY AREA

• **OBJECTIVE**

- 1) To build immunity in the students
- 2) To eliminate rubella.
- 3) To prevent girl students from the ill effects associated with the rubella virus
- 4) To prevent rubella infection in girls during early pregnancy
- 5) To meet the need for an international standard for anti- rubella serum

• THE CONTEXT

Rubella is caused by a virus from the genus rubiuius. Its symptoms include low grade fever, respiratory problems, and most normally a rash of pink colour on body. A woman who contacts rubella infection during pregnancy can pass the infection to the developing foetus. If the foetus survives the child may suffer from a wide range of birth defects, including deafness, eye defects.

• THE PRACTICE

The rubella vaccination drive was organised for girls on 8th march 2017. 209 girls students were administered rubella vaccine by the team of eminent doctors from ace women hospital under the leadership of dr. Roopeshri Bhoyar

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS : Initially it was not easy to convince parents and students about the vaccine. But the figure of this year 209 indicates that the college succeeds in bringing the awareness among the girls about the vaccine.

• THE PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED & RESOURCE REQUIRED

Eminent doctors team and rubella vaccines were required for organising the camp. it was a challenge to produce vaccine at subsidised rates. it was difficult to convince the parent about the usefulness of the vaccine. parents were sceptical about the side effects of the vaccine.

ANNEXURE – 4

2ND BEST PRACTICE COUNSELLING BY FACULTIES TO ADDRESS SOCIO-PSYCHOLOGICAL ISSUES OF THE STUDENTS

• **OBJECTIVE**

- 1. To help students gain an insight into the origin and development of emotional difficulties, leading to an increased capacity to take rational control over the feelings and actions.
- 2. To alter maladjusted behaviour of students.
- 3. To assist students to move in the direction of fulfilling their potential or achieve an integration of conflicting elements within themselves.

• THE CONTEXT

The provision of effective socio-psychological counselling help to improve the self -image of the students and broaden their educational and occupational ambitions. Counselling by faculties is a learning – oriented process which occurs usually in an interactive social relationship. The students learn more about the self that enables him or her to behave adequately in the society.

• THE PRACTICE

A socio-psychological counselling session of m.sc. Maths students was conducted by dr. Suruchi dabir on 5th april 2017. 15 students underwent the psychological counselling therapy. Dr. Suruchio dabir dealt with emotional distress and behavioural problems of the students and also addressed the anxiety of the students over a currier decision.

• EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: Exercise proved to be fruitful because at the counselling session two of the M.Sc. (Maths) students we have decided to drop the course gain the much-needed confidence and finally crack the first year with good marks also.

• THE PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED & RESOURCE REQUIRED

It is usually difficult to make the students feel comfortable to share their emotional problems with the outsider. Most of the times students do not open up which creates difficulties in addressing their emotional and behavioural problems. Interactive relationship environment between the faculties and students helps in overcoming the problem.
