# 1ST BEST PRACTICE

Free Bone mineral density check-ups camp for employees, stakeholders and residents of nearby areas.

#### **OBJECTIVE**

- 1. To enable people to know their BMD and to have understanding of their bones at earliest stage
- 2. To detect osteoporosis and predict the risk of bone fracture.
- 3. To provide the basic health care facility free of cost to the residents of nearby areas as a part of community extension service.
- 4. The camp address the problems of person above 40 years of age suffering from back pain, joint pain, kidney diseases, postmenopausal women.
- 5. Free consultation by well-known orthopaedic doctors

#### THE CONTEXT.

A bone mineral density (BMD) test measures the amount of calcium and other minerals present in the bones. The health care provider uses this test to predict the risk of bone fractures in elderly person by using special X-ray computed tomography scan. The information is used to estimate the strength of the bones. All Women above the age of 65 have an increased risk for osteoporosis. Person suffering from chronic kidney disease, rheumatoid arthritis is also prone to osteoporosis.

#### THE PRACTICE

Bone mineral density check-ups camp is organized every year for the employees and stakeholders. This year it was conducted for the residents of nearby area also. Dr Piyush Thakkar and Dr. Kumud Thakkar conducted the test by using peripheral DEXA machine.

#### EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

There was as overwhelming response to the drive. 200 persons underwent the test. Person tested positive for the test were referred to orthopaedic surgeon. Calcium tablets were prescribed for them. Orientation lecture regarding the diet food for maintaining the bone mineral and preventing osteoporosis was also given to the residents and employees.

#### PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED.

It was difficult to convince the residents of nearby area about the worthiness of the drive as they belonged to poor socio- economic background. Women were not aware of their depleting bone condition and its repercussion in future. We faced difficulties in procuring the peripheral DEXA machine at reasonable rates.

# Workshop on self-defence & yoga

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- 1) To empower women
- 2) To enable girls to defend them against any type of physical assault.
- 3) To build self-confidence so that they contribute meaningfully in their own development, shape their own destiny and capacity enhancement through self-defence training
- 4) Workshop on yoga enables the student to have good health and mental hygiene
- 5) To integrate the moral values of the students.
- 6) To attain higher level of consciousness.

#### **CONTEXT**

Yoga education could help students to equip them with basic knowledge about one's personality, to learn to handle oneself well in all life situations, to develop a discriminative mind capable of understanding right and wrong. Yoga education enables in enhancing all the activities of the students, be it academic, sports or social. Yoga techniques aims in improving the focus, stamina and co- ordination of the students.

Proper knowledge of self-defence techniques and strategies is an invaluable resource especially for the girls. Introductory self-defence workshop enables the girl student to gain the skills and confidence necessary to protect themselves. The workshop deals with conditioning, how to avoid conflict and how to deal with real world situations. Self-defence training enables the students to learn grabs, take downs, wrestling positions in easy and effective manner.

#### THE PRACTICE

Our college has been conducting the self defence workshop since 2013 in association with RENOVATIO. BLACK BELT and mixed martial art trainer Shri Vikram Singh Thakur and Shubham Chaudhary train the girl students on basic techniques of self-defence and mixed martial art. The workshop is for two hours for consecutively three days.

Renowned expert of yoga Shri Baraskar Guruji give yoga training to the students two days in a week.

#### **EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS**

Approximately 50 to 60 girls participate in the workshop of self-defence every year. Awareness about self-defence is increasing with every passing year. Certificate of participation are distributed to the students. Due to overwhelming response of the girl students to the self defence workshop, college is planning to extend the duration of workshop to 8 days.

Approximately 150 students participated in yoga workshop conducted on Saturdays and Sundays every week.

#### PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

It was difficult to convince the parents of girl students to enrol their wards for the self-defence course due to the conservative background. The capacity of auditorium is limited to 100 students for self-defence course. Span of control of a trainer was limited to 10 students which increases the number of trainers for the workshop.

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
